In the 18th year of Josiah's reign, when that good king of Judah was only 26 years old, he sent Shaphan the scribe to the temple of God in Jerusalem to arrange needed temple repairs with Hilkiah, the high priest.

Before Shaphan left, Hilkiah gave him a book he had found in some dark, seldom-used recess of the temple. It was the book of the law of God, long lost and forgotten by God's people. Shaphan immediately took it to Josiah.

Josiah discovered commands from God that were unknown, disregarded or forgotten. The young king called for repentance for the nation's rejection of God's divine pattern and urged the people to return to keeping God's law (2 Kings 22)

Perhaps we of more-modern times have a similar problem. We haven't lost the book, for the Bible is still intact and easily at our disposal; but God's word has been neglected, misused, misquoted and rejected by the masses. We must find the book of the law with all its purity - without addition or subtraction - and restore New Testament Christianity as it was given by Jesus Christ and his apostles.

Like Josiah, we have been given solemn warning about changing God's word. "But even if we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel to you than what we have preached to you, let him be accursed. As we have said before, so now I say again, if anyone preaches any other gospel to you than what you have received, let him be accursed" (Galatians 1:8, 9).

We would all do well to follow the Master's example.

To be right, both morally and doctrinally, is imperative; to be right in our treatment of others is no less important.

Being long on scriptural argument provides no license for coming up short on scriptural attitude.

"Repay no one evil for evil. Have regard for good things in the sight of all men. If it is possible, as much as depends on you, live peaceably with all men. Beloved, do not avenge yourselves, but rather give place to wrath; for it is written, 'Vengeance is Mine, I will repay,' says the Lord. Therefore 'If your enemy is hungry, feed him; If he is thirsty, give him a drink; For in so doing you will heap coals of fire on his head.' Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good" (Romans 12:17-21).

Let's all determine to be more like Christ, "speaking the truth in love" (Ephesians 4:15), and less like the dog-eat-dog, anything-goes world working feverishly to shape us into its mold.

Let's be kind.

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THE PASSION OF CHRIST

In Acts 1:1-3 we read the following inspired words of Luke: "The former treatise I made, O Theophilus, concerning all that Jesus began both to do and to teach, until the day in which he was received up, after that he had given commandment through the Holy Spirit unto the apostles whom he had chosen: to whom he also showed himself alive after his passion by many proofs, appearing unto them by the space of forty days, and speaking the things concerning the kingdom of God" (ASV).

Note the statement, "after his passion." Luke describes Jesus' life in the flesh as his "passion." The Greek word here translated "passion" means simply "suffering." Many English translations use the word suffering in this passage. It is an amazing thought that Luke, by inspiration, describes the life of Jesus with this very suggestive word. As the great prophet Isaiah looked to the coming of the Messiah, he described him as being "a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief" (Isaiah 53:3).

An interesting incident is recorded in Luke chapter 24. On the very day of Jesus' resurrection, we read of two disciples walking to Emmaus. They were discussing the things that had taken place concerning Jesus (i.e. his arrest and crucifixion). At this moment, Jesus appeared to them. But their eyes were restrained so that they did not know him. As Jesus talked with these two disciples, he said to them, "Ought not Christ to have suffered these things and to enter into his glory?" It is obvious that Christ's mission into this world to become mankind's Savior involved suffering.

No one knew more about the suffering of Jesus than the apostle Peter did. Having a very close and intimate relationship with our Lord, he was permitted to be an eyewitness to Jesus' earthly suffering. In Peter's first epistle, he emphasized this fact several times. He wrote that Christ "suffered for us . . ." (1 Peter 2:21), that Christ "suffered once for sins, the just for the unjust . . ." (1 Peter 3:18), and that Christ "suffered for us in the

flesh..." (1 Peter 4:1). In Acts chapter 17 we read of the apostle Paul arriving at Thessalonica. As his custom was, he went to the local synagogue where the Jews worshipped, and we are told that he, "reasoned with them from the Scriptures, explaining and demonstrating that the Christ had to suffer and rise again from the dead . .." (Acts 17:3). Notice that he "had to suffer!"

All one has to do is read about the agony of our Lord in the Garden in the night of his arrest to realize how much Jesus was willing to endure for mankind. Sitting at the right hand of the Father is One who was willing to suffer greatly for us in order to become our sin offering. Jesus loves us so much and his earthly passion culminated with excruciating and agonizing death on the cross. Considering how much Jesus loves us, may we - as Paul advises all Christians to do - "rejoice in the Lord always" (Philippians 4:4). Truly, his love for you and me was, and continues to be, unmatched
